

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Production restarts



China gathers pace...but supply issues loom

- OEMs report increasing activity, with April sales and production expected to improve back to around 75% normal levels
- Government support including EV incentives, lifting new car limits in cities
- Some direct support in coordinating production and logistics, including in Wuhan
- However, sources at manufacturers suggest China will feel disruption in global supply chains, i.e. parts shortages and logistics delays out of Europe
- Weaker brands pull back...Renault withdraws, could PSA be next?





Production restarts



Europe – first flashes of life

- Component and powertrain plants coming back online for VW Group, BMW, Daimler
- Assembly restarts now include **Hyundai-Kia** in Czech and Slovakia, **Magna** in Austria, **Renault** in Portugal
- Next two weeks: Daimler and Mercedes-Benz in Germany, VW Group in Germany, Czech Republic, Slovakia, Belgium, Portugal, Spain, Renault-Dacia in Romania, Toyota in France & Poland, Volvo in Sweden
- Early May: BMW, Ford, PSA Group, Renault-Nissan,
 FCA, Seat
- Many start dates tentative and liable to be pushed back









A new normal that is anything but...



- Safety, distancing and PPE requirements
- Highly volatile supply
- Logistics constraints
- Low output with most sales channels still closed until lockdown measures are eased
- Focus on resilience over lean?
