Supply chain restarts



China increasing the model for restart

- OEMs report increasing activity. Volkswagen Group confirms that it is back up to 70% of production, and expects to reach or surpass pre-crisis in early summer
- China template for European and future US restarts: temperature testing, mask, social distancing
- Some industries report they can still produce at close to full productivity...automotive a question mark
- China a key PPE source for restarts VW will make masks in Tianjin, and export to Europe
- China still subject to global supply shortages, but supply chain proving robust so far.
- Alternative shipping routes China-Europe rail increase







Supply chain restarts



Europe - picking up the (slow) pace

- More plants in Germany, Czech Republic, Slovakia, Romania and France have reopened, notably VW in Zwickau and Wolfsburg, Mercedes trucks in Sindelfingen and Bremen, Renault in Flins and Toyota in Valenciennes
- First plants reopening in Italy (FCA Sevel) and Spain (Seat)
- Early May: BMW, Ford, PSA Group, Renault-Nissan, FCA.
- JLR is now planned for May 18th
- Fewer shifts, reduced output, longer takt times but new processes across supply chain
- Dealers starting to open (70% in Germany)
- Restart hangs on supply availability, logistics and demand
- Ports and warehouse space issues; liquidity risks






Supply Chain restarts



US/North America – the next phase

- Suppliers beginning restarts, with Mercedes-Benz in Alabama first to reopen assembly
- Early May restarts in the South: BMW in South Carolina,
 Kia in Georgia, Hyundai in Alabama, VW in Tennessee
- Most planned for later in May but uncertainty over union agreements in US and Canada, state rules in Michigan
- Mexico government now allowing plants to reopen but OEMs are cautious. VW delayed to May 18th
- Mexico suppliers and cross-border supply
- More US dealerships can open, some increases in activity –
 but volume expected to remain low
- Storage issues at ports and transport network






Global snapshots – Third wave?


- South Korea was never under lockdown production reduced, but Hyundai and Kia mainly stable
- Japan state of emergency Toyota, Honda, Nissan,
 Subaru, Suzuki suspend most production to Mid-May
- India remains under lockdown until May 3rd and likely extended – significant disruption for restart
- Brazil plants still facing extended closures
- Reopening in Morocco and South Africa sequences after
 Europe but supply chain disrupted
- Low death rates in Africa, South-east Asia but rising case numbers still point to risk of a third wave in the developed world that continues to disrupt supply chain
